Research on The Mount Gay Story & Free People of Colour in Bridgetown Revealed through History Group

he Barbados Museum and Historical Society's History Group got off to a grand start for 2013.

On January 9, Linda Bowen gave a presentation entitled The Mount Gay Story: The Contribution of the Ward Family and Mount Gay Rum to the Social, Political, Economic and Cultural Life of Barbados. A large audience, made up of many Ward descendants, was on hand to take in the presentation which explored the role which the Ward family and Mount Gay Rum have played in the history and culture of Barbados. A brief background of the Wards, Mount Gay and Mount Gay Rum before 1908. 1908 was the turning point for both the Ward family and Mount Gay Rum. The focus of the talk was on the 20th century history and development of the Ward Family, Mount Gay Rum and their connection to the economic, social, cultural and political development of Barbados.

Linda Bowen is a member of the Ward and Greaves families, the latter also from St. Lucy, but with roots from over 100 years ago in Amerindian Guyana. She was born at Oxford Plantation in St Peter, one of the sugar estates owned by her grandfather Aubrey FitzOsbert Ward. She grew up experiencing a fascinating childhood at another sugar plantation - Bourbon Plantation, St. Lucy. Since 1978, Linda Bowen has worked at The St. Michael School, teaching History, Art, Geography and English Literature. In 2011, she was appointed Deputy Principal, a position she continues to hold today.



Rum, Art and Heritage Tour

n February 14, 37 people travelled through Barbados as part of the Rum, Art and Heritage Tour. The tour had been in the planning stages since late 2012 and was created as an activity by me for the BMHS History Group. In many respects, the tour was a follow-up to the first lecture in the History Group series for 2013, presented by Mrs. Linda Bowen nee Ward, and focused on the Ward family of Mount Gay and its central role in the development of one of Barbados' premier rum labels. The tour started at the Barbados Museum with a tour of the Harewood, Warmington and Cunard galleries where I, as tour guide, set the historical context of the tour. From the museum the touring party travelled by bus to the Mount Gay Visitor Centre at Spring Garden, where they participated in a tour of that facility which included a rum tasting session. From Mount Gay the tour group travelled north along the West Coast through Holetown and then Speightstown, where more of Barbados heritage and history were highlighted.

In St. Lucy the tour made two "familial" stops one at Fair Field and the other at Fairmount Plantations. At Fair Field, the tour party was treated to a history of Fair Field presented by John Ward, Manager of the property, and then Linda Bowen read a poem about her memories of Fair Field from her childhood. The tour party was joined by Mr. Roy Ward, the 96 year old patriarch of the Ward family. At Fairmount, Roy Ward regaled the tour party with stories of his youth spent there. The tour proceeded to the Rum Refinery of Mount Gay where the group was taken on a

tour of the refinery by Oscar Waithe and was given a detailed account of the art of refining rum. The tour party's last stop was at Colleton House in St. Lucy for lunch and a tour of the house and its amazing art collection, assembled by the previous owner the late Frank Rickwood. The tour at Colleton was conducted by Garry Burke, Rickwood's nephew. From Colleton, the tour returned to the Barbados Museum. The BMHS would like to take this opportunity to thank all of those who contributed to the tour: Mount Gay Visitor Centre, Dr. Frank Ward of The Rum Refinery of Mount Gay, John Ward and Linda Bowen, Geoffrey Greaves of Fairmount and finally to the 37 wonderful people who participated in tour. he Barbados Association of Guidance Counsellors held its annual National Careers Showcase at the Garfield Sobers Gymnasium on February 14 and 15.

The Barbados Museum was invited to participate by a former volunteer Jennifer Goodridge who is now a Guidance Counsellor. he 2013 Lecture Series was launched on March 1 with most of the sponsors in attendance and apologies from the two sponsors who were unable to be there. Representatives of the Insurance Corporation of Barbados Ltd., the Central Bank of Barbados, and Sagicor General Insurance Inc. spoke enthusiastically about the value of the series. Two lecturers, Dr. Henderson Carter of the University of the West Indies' Department of History and Philosophy, and Mr. Bentley Gibbs, also attended the event.

The theme for the series is **The Emancipation Project, 1838-1937**.

The lecturers for the ten lectures in the series are Professor Sir Hilary Beckles, Dr. David Browne, Mr. Bentley Gibbs, Dr. Henderson Carter, Professor Sir Woodville Marshall, Dr. Aviston Downes, Professor Pedro Welch, Dr. Janice Mayers, Dr. Tara Inniss and Dr. Marcia Burrowes.

The Series runs from March 14 to May 16, 2013.

Colleton Open House

Barbados Museum Historical Society, collaboration with the owners of Colleton Great House, hosted an Open House on March 17 from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The objective of this activity was to help raise funds for the BMHS to acquire the House's collections, which consist of one of the world's private collections of black men and women in western art by famous European artists of the last 400 years, and The Frank Rickwood collection of indigenous art. The latter includes 157 pieces

from Africa and Papua New Guinea which have been described by Caribbean academic Lennox Honychurch as "remarkable by any standard" and have been highly praised by the Smithsonian Institute.

Colleton House was established after Sir John Colleton fled from England after the execution of King Charles 1 during the Civil War, bought 700 acres of land and became a sugar planter. The house was acquired and restored by Australian geologist Frank

Rickwood in 1989, and it was his home until his death in 2009.

The feature attraction of the Open House event was an illustrated talk by Dr. Temi Odumosu, Marie Curie Postdoctoral Fellow for EUROTAST at University of Copenhagen. It was entitled Presence and Place: Images of Africans in 18th Century British Print Culture. The talk explored the rich world of images and ideas that emerged through printed images and texts published primarily in London. Dr. Odumosu investigated the fluid ways in which race and aesthetics converged in London's buoyant visual culture. In doing so, the discussion ultimately sought to reconstruct a more detailed sense of presence and place for people of African descent during the colonial period. The diverse forms in which we find Black bodies and faces was examined: autonomously in rare engraved portraits, as exaggerated caricatures, discussed in political and philosophical tracts, as motifs on trading cards, human curiosities advertised in playbills, or as the focus of proand anti-slavery propaganda.

Lots of volunteers were needed to ensure the smooth execution of the event and 21 generous individuals answered the call. Staff members, Museum members, Museum volunteers and Friends of the Museum rendered assistance at the entrance, in the rooms of the House, in the indigenous art exhibit room and at The Museum Shop sale table. We are sincerely grateful to all those who supported this initiative either by patronizing the event or by lending a hand.

Sugar in the Blood

he book Sugar in the Blood: A Family Story of Slavery and Empire by Andrea Stuart was launched by the National Cultural Foundation (NCF), in collaboration with the BMHS, on March 18 at the Museum. The large audience included many relatives from the Ashby line, on whom the book is based. They were thrilled to hear about how Stuart set about researching the story of her earliest known maternal ancestor, George Ashby, who set sail from England to settle in Barbados and fell into the life of becoming a sugarcane plantation owner.

On March 20, the NCF held a Creative Writing Master Class, followed by a Panel Discussion entitled Family History as National History: The Nexxus between Academic and Popular Discourse, both at the Museum. Panellists were Andrea Stuart, Professor Pedro Welch and Dr. Tara Inniss. This discussion on the place of creative nonfiction in understanding historical narratives was moderated by Dr. Marcia Burrowes.
