

HIV/AIDS Puzzle Launch



or World Aids Day, 1st December, the staff at the Barbados Museum and Historical Society wore "red" and the museum launched its HIV/AIDS Awareness puzzle. Designed by "Native Images", the 60-piece jigsaw puzzle is both educational and fun and suitable for children ages five to 10 years. Approximately 160 students and their teachers, from 26 primary schools across the island benefited from a feature address given by Dr. Vijaya Thani on the issues associated with HIV/AIDS and how children specifically can take steps and make wise choices at their age before having sexual relations. Dario Waldron, NIFCA Gold Award winner in drama, and

his drummer Kemar Batson gave a dramatic piece entitled "HIV Waiting" followed by Ishiaka McNeil and Troy Special who also did a

PROJECTS IN BRIEF

HIV/AIDS Awareness Programmes

The Barbados Museum and Historical Society participated in a number of activities for HIV/AIDS Awareness Week, 16th - 22nd October, co-coordinated by the Assistant Curator - Art. Apart from the ongoing Food Drive and ribbon distribution which concluded on December 1st 2005, a half-day session dedicated to educating the staff on issues associated with HIV/AIDS in the workplace occurred on 18th October.

This interactive and power point presentation was done by volunteer with the National HIV/AIDS Commission, Ms. Jennifer Walker.

One of the major highlights for that week was a puppet show organised for approximately 162 primary school students from St. Winifred's School, St. Paul's Primary, Bay Primary, Erdiston Primary, Garrison Secondary (first formers) and People's Cathedral School, on the morning of Thursday 20th October. The Rennie Puppet Project featured five puppets informing students on the dangers of HIV/AIDS and the challenges one character was experiencing as a result of being diagnosed with HIV/AIDS.

The HIV/AIDS Awareness initiative will continue to make an impact on our staff and the wider public through the following upcoming activities:

- Red HIV/AIDS Awareness Museum T-shirts for staff
- Publication of an educational workbook
- Workshop for people living with HIV/AIDS
- Exhibition proposed for April 2006

MA Conference in London

The Museum Association's (MA) Conference was held from 24th to 26th October at the Queen Elizabeth II Conference Centre in Westminster and tackled four broad themes: collections for the future, valuing learning, cultural tourism and world cities, world cultures.

Ms. Alissandra Cummins, BMHS Director and ICOM President, was one of the keynote speakers on the first day of the conference. Other keynote speakers included Mr. David Lammy, British Culture Minister, Ms. Jude Kelly, Artistic Director of the South Bank Centre, and Ms. Kate Brindley, Director of Bristol Museums, Galleries and Archives. The event was opened by Ms. Nicky Gavron, Deputy Mayor of London, who replaced Mr. Ken Livingstone, Mayor of London, as he was unable to attend.

In her speech, working with the community was one of the issues raised by Ms. Cummins in relation to cultural tourism. She noted, "Cultural tourism has an ethical basis to which all museums should subscribe. Museums should participate in the life and local wisdom of the host community." She went on to explain that the primary audience is the local community with visitors as a secondary target. "However, when it comes to the Caribbean as a whole," she said, "it's necessary to try and reach a global audience – since there are more Caribbeans living outside of the region than in it." Ms. Cummins spoke about how

museums must establish a balance between the needs of its host community and external visitors.

The Director also took the opportunity to describe a number of projects currently underway in Barbados, some of which will appeal to both international and internal visitors.

In the December 2005 issue of the Museum Association's journal, the Director was also interviewed on the subject of her appointment as the first female president of the International Council of Museums (ICOM).

PROJECTS IN BRIEF

Concorde Exhibits and Museum Study Tour in Britain

From 15th through 25th October 2005 a team of interested and involved individuals representing a variety of agencies in Barbados toured a number of museums and installations of the British Airways Concorde Aircraft. Organized by Barbados Tourism Investment, Inc. and supported in part by British Airways and the Government of Barbados the study tour was intended to provide the various agencies involved in development of the Concorde Experience in Barbados with insights into what had already been accomplished by sister organizations in the United Kingdom. Stops were also made at a number of non-Concorde museums for the purpose of establishing relationships for the development of mutual assistance with museum exhibits and touring exhibit exchanges. Further stops were made at a number of tourism development and urban renewal agencies, again for the purpose of establishing productive connections with individuals able to provide insights and assistance for similar projects in Barbados. The Barbados Museum was represented by Dr. Thomas Loftfield, Deputy Director.

Three complete Concorde installations were visited along with two exhibits of partial elements of the Concorde aircraft. Each installation and exhibit presented significantly different elements of Concorde within an obviously similar framework. Indeed, it was experiencing the different approaches to Concorde that was, perhaps, the most informative aspect of the study tour. The team visited Concorde exhibits at East Fortune in Scotland, and Filton and Manchester in England where observations were made on the technical and social aspects of the displays. Many significant data were obtained that will assist Barbados in mounting a world-class display of the Concorde aircraft that has been left in our care.

The team also visited the British Airways Museum and Archive. The staff there were extremely warm, friendly, and welcoming, and seemed genuinely interested in assisting Barbados in developing the Concorde Experience. Offers were made of access to film footage, documents, and other Concorde paraphernalia as available. A working revisit to this facility will definitely be necessary as the Barbados presentation of Concorde develops.

Other museum visits included the British Empire and Commonwealth Museum in Bristol. Contacts were made with staff there, primarily Mr. John McAleer, who has an interest in cooperatively designing exhibits to commemorate the bicentennial of the abolition of the transatlantic slave trade for 2007. There is an extremely high potential in this contact for cooperative exhibits to travel back and forth between Bristol and Barbados.

A stop was made at the Albert Dock in Liverpool to see the permanent exhibition on the transatlantic slave trade. While no contacts were made it was informative to see how the topic was treated and presented at what is widely viewed as the best museum exhibit on this topic anywhere. Given the obvious applicability to Barbados this stop was entirely rewarding.

A visit was made to the British Museum to establish contact with staff there. An initial contact was made with Dr. Irving Finkel, Assistant Keeper, Ancient Near East. It was originally hoped to interest him in sending us a traveling exhibit on the Ancient Near East just to expand the offerings of the Barbados Museum, but Dr. Finkel suggested a much more interesting traveling exhibit dealing with mankala, draughts, and dominos. Given the close association of the first game with the African Diaspora, and the tight association of the latter two with Barbados, this exhibit sounded much more appealing. It will serve the Barbados Museum very well to have exhibits coming to Barbados from the British Museum.



FRAINING/ACTIVITES AT THE MUSEUM

Swedish Conservator's Trip

The Museum was privileged to have the services of Eirik Granqvist during the period November 2nd to November 14th. Eirik Granqvist is one of the few natural history conservators in the world and has worked in France, Finland, Sweden, Africa, and North America among other places.

Dr. Granqvist's specialties include taxidermy, reconstruction of extinct animals, conservation of natural history objects and the construction of dioramas. He is particularly proud of Prehistorama, a French museum (the first of its kind) which is devoted to the origins and evolution of life and Man.

During his stay the conservator accessed the storage and condition of the Museum's natural history collection. The Assistant Curator – Natural History was able under Dr. Granqvist's guidance to learn and acquire practical experience in conservation methods and techniques used with natural objects.

At the end of his visit Dr. Granqvist submitted a report which will greatly aid in the future conservation and development of the natural history collection.

Natural History Curator gets basic training in Bryology

You may be wondering what Bryology is! It is the study of mosses, liverworts and hornworts. These are simple plants which are found in damp places and are dependent on water for their reproduction. To most of us, moss is just "green stuff" which grows on the damp areas in our yards. However, when the "green stuff" is examined under a microscope beautiful plants which have a

multiplicity of defining characteristics are revealed.

During the period 6th to 21st December, Monique Ifill, the Curator for Natural History was privileged to receive basic training at the University of Puerto Rico, Mayagüez Campus. Instruction was freely given by Dr. Inez Sastre De-Jesus, a tropical Bryologist.

During her stay in Puerto Rico Ms. Ifill was given private lectures which outlined the characteristics of each division, features used to identify important families, and definitive differences among the families.

She also gained practical experience in the identification of mosses and liverworts.

The visit was very useful and will contribute to the efficient curatorship of the natural history collection.

MUSEUM HIGHLIGHTS

Public Art: The Creation and Care of Murals and Monuments

A lecture/discussion entitled "Public Art: The Creation and Care of Murals and Monuments" was hosted by the National Art Gallery Committee (NAGC) at the Museum on 23rd November. It was led by Mr. Angel Santiago-Torres, Objects Conservator for Museo de Arte de Ponce in Puerto Rico.

Presentation of Punishment Collar and Balls Plantation Deed

The Museum has been the recipient of two extremely important and informative gifts. On 24th November an official presentation of a punishment collar and the original deed for Balls Plantation was made to the Barbados Museum & Historical Society. These donations were accepted by BMHS Council President Dr. Trevor Carmichael.

Mr. Paul Altman, on behalf of the Jewish Synagogue Restoration Committee, donated an iron punishment collar that was recovered from the grounds of the synagogue during renovation activities. Given the highly disturbed context from which the collar was recovered there can be demonstrated no direct association between the collar and the Jewish community. The collar was sent to the Centre de Conservation du Quebec for necessary conservation of the iron. This service was provided at a discounted rate through the good services of Mr. Nicholas St. Cyr who facilitated contact among the Museum, Mr. Altman, and the conservation centre.

The mortgage deed for Balls Plantation in Christ Church was donated on the same date by Mr. and Mrs. John Cole. While a number of similar enumerations exist for various plantations on the island, this one is of special interest because the effective date of the mortgage deed is 1 August 1834, Emancipation Day in the British colonies. The fact that the former slaves continued to be enumerated is not an error, but reflects the fact that an element of emancipation was the payment of compensation to the former owners for loss of property that was the financial effect of granting freedom to the enslaved. The mortgage deed for Balls Plantation thus illustrates nicely in a threedimensional manner some of the complexities through which Barbadian society was moving as a consequence of emancipation.

These two gifts have added substantially to the holdings of the Museum in the areas of enslavement, economics, and social interaction. We are extremely appreciative of the generosity of the donors.

Fine Craft Festival




