

# THE BARBADOS MUSEUM AND HISTORICAL SOCIETY

#### REPORT OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30TH APRIL 1982

The Council takes pleasure in presenting its report on the affairs of the Society during the past year.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

The past year has been a very eventful one for the Barbados Museum and Historical Society. On March 12th, 1981, Miss Alissandra Cummins was appointed Trainee Director. She is a young Barbadian who was studying Art at the University of East Anglia in Norwich. Due to many changes of staff at the Museum much of the Council's time during the year was taken up with administrative affairs. Mrs. Hinkson resigned in May. Also in May, differences between the Director, Mr. Robert Moss, and the Council had grown to such an extent that they were forced to ask for his resignation. This became effective May 31st. The Council decided to advertise for a new Director, and for the interim appointed the Administrative Officer, Mr. E. G. Fraser, to the post of Acting Director. On July 9th Mrs. Frances Brinkley, formerly Curator of Carriacou Museum, was employed as Special Assistant to the Acting Director. She began work on the 1st of August. Miss Cummins returned to Barbados in August after receiving a B.A. Degree with Honours in the History of Art and worked at the Museum before going on for further training. She was introduced to the Council on September 19th. She did a very competent job before she left in October for a two-year course in Museology at the University of Leicester, and the prospects are that she will make an outstanding Director. In November Mr. David Devenish, of the Hastings Museum in England, was chosen from applicants for the post as new Director. He arrived on March 2nd, 1982. USEUM

HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

The outstanding feature of the Museum's year was the completion of the upper courtyard. This restoration was made possible by the generosity of the Sample Foundation, through the good offices of Mrs. Sally Aall. Very fortunately this was accomplished in time for Carifesta. The Museum was the venue for visiting performers on eight nights. At the same time an excellent exhibition of the crafts of Barbados was designed and set up by Mrs. Norma Talma. This was opened by the Minister of Education, Miss Billie Miller, who suggested that it would be of great benefit to all school children for their teachers to arrange for them to visit this exhibition.

Upon the upper courtyard's completion Mrs. Jean Goddard took on the extensive and strenuous job of re-decorating the Cunard Gallery and re-hanging the paintings and prints. This could not have been done without the help of David Clarke, a student in the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme. The Gallery was re-opened in December at a small press reception. The new Cunard is enhanced by the publication "Paintings and Prints in Barbados" by Mr. Peter Campbell which was issued in August. Plans are for a small military gallery to be opened this spring next to the Cunard Gallery. This will be the Challenor Room and will contain the museum's military collections. It is named in honour of the six of seven Challenor brothers who served in the armed forces.

In October a series of exhibits titled: "Treasures From The Museum Storerooms" was initiated. To date there have been four of these: "Classical Greece as seen by Wedgwood", "The Unforgotten Brave", "Gifts Barbadians May Have Given in the Old Days", and "Oriental Ivories, The Ivory Zoo, and a Special Ivory". These have teen well received and have had good exposure on Voice of Barbados, Larbados Rediffusion and CBC-TV. "The Unforgotten Brave" was borrowed by the Military Cemetery Association for the rededication of the cemetery on November 11th, 1981.

Also in October, Mr. Arie Boomert, an Archaeologist who is a Fellow in the Department of History at the U.W.I. in Trinidad, gave a Lecture on "Caribs and Arawaks in West Indian History" co-sponsored by Cave Hill and the Museum. He spent the better part of a week at the Museum assisting by identifying artifacts in the Amerindian collection.

In January 1982, the Museum put out a brochure as it was felt that many visitors to the Island were unaware of the Museum's existence, or of what it offered. The cost of the brochure was met by the generosity of fourteen firms and organisations who are members of the Museum.

The Lecture Room and an adjoining gallery were devoted to an exhibition of paintings by Aileen Hamilton during the month of

February 1982. The exhibition was opened by Lady Adams. Mrs. Hamilton is a Barbadian now residing in England, but she returned to Barbados to set up the exhibition and be present during it.

In the course of the Museum's year two sub-committees were formed. One prepared a Preliminary Museum Development Report, and the other is at present working on plans for the Museum's Jubilee in 1983.

The Museum has received a number of gifts, and the Council expresses its gratitude of all to those who have enhanced the treasures of the Museum.

Highlights among these were F. Barralier's Map of Bridgetown and Carlisle Bay in 1818, artifacts from a slave graveyard at Newton, Christ Church, the repaired works of an 1825 grandfather clock belonging to the Museum, and a restored watercolour of the Town Hall Gaol and Courthouse in 1813 by Richard Jewitt.

The Council welcomes the new Director, Mr. David Devenish. He has a difficult task ahead if for no other reason that so much is expected from him. He has to be a technocrat Curator, and administrator and a public relations man all in one. We wish him well and trust that his stay in Barbados will be both beneficial to the Museum and a pleasant experience for himself, his wife and his three cats.

The Museum entered into an agreement with the Barbados Government dated 9th April 1979 for a 4% loan of \$50,000 repayable over a ten year period in half-yearly instalments of interest and principal. No interest was paid during the year, and none has been accrued. No repayment of principal was made.

#### 8. TAXATION

The Barbados Museum and Historical Society is a registered benevolent organisation and is therefore exempt from income tax in accordance with section 4 (b) of the Income Tax Act.

#### 9. SUBSCRIPTION INCOME

Subscription income is accounted for on the basis of subscriptions received with no recognition being made for subscriptions due.

#### 10. COURTYARD REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

During the year to April 30, 1981 the Barbados Mutual Society of New England donated amounts totalling \$46,814 US (1980 \$32,000 US) for the benefit of the Society towards the cost of alterations to the East Courtyard and related expenses. At the balance sheet date the work was unfinished and additional amounts were subsequently donated to the Society by the Barbados Mutual Society of New England to cover these additional costs. The amounts donated and the expenditure met from these donations are not included in the financial statements.
