

of

the late

Sir John Dear, K.C.M.G., C.H.B., Q.C.



Mr. J. S. B. 'Jack' Dear, (later Sir John) became a member of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society on the 6th of October 1952. From the inception of his membership, which spanned four decades, his service to the Museum was invaluable. He is credited with the development of the Museum in Barbadian society through his pivotal role and the generous assistance he rendered to the home of Barbadian culture. His staunch commitment to the reorganisation of the Society was founded on his confidence in the value of the organisation to the process of national development.

In 1961 he became the editor of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society's Journal and remained in that capacity until 1972. He later became the President of the Society from 1976 to 1983. His chairmanship of the Council was characterised by a decisiveness, and vision for the future that guided the transformation of the institution into the professional organisation that exists today.

The Society was on many occasions, the grateful recipient of the President's generous support through his timely donations and enthusiastic participation in many of the Museum's fund-raising events. In an interview with the "Sunday Sun" dated June 1996 Sir Jack mused that he believed his knighthood was conferred because of his contribution specifically to the Barbados Museum. He stated "I succeeded, not totally by myself of course, to transform the Museum into a public entity".

His commitment and dedication to the development of the Museum was recognised when the new Museum Administration wing was named in his honour in 1989. His absence will be a long felt loss to this institution, its Council, Staff and members.

ATTENDANCE

During 1995-96 a total of 5,284 adults and 935 children visited the Museum. In addition 251 visitors viewed our temporary exhibitions in the Exhibition Gallery. Some 6,005 school children including teachers visited the Museum. Group tours including 168 persons visited the Museum. Some 800 persons visited us on May 18th Open Day, and over 800 people attended our Fine Craft Festival.

In 1996-97 a total of 10, 751 adults and 1,038 children visited the Museum during the year. Temporary exhibitions, while viewed by most of our general visitorship, was the specific focus of some 177 visitors. School children numbering over 5,700 including their teachers, made use of the museum's galleries and special programmes. Group tours consisted of 819 persons. The Museum's Annual Open Day on May 18th garnered over 800 supporters, while more than 700 people made our annual Craft Festival a success.

PUBLICATIONS

Volume 42 of the Museum's Journal, a special commemorative issue proposed for 1994-95, was delayed at press due to the incompletion of commissioned text. Work continued on its preparation throughout this period.

The Museum's quarterly newsletter continued publication throughout the period, and its format was updated with the use of a new logo.

CAPITAL WORKS

The Main Store roof replacement was largely completed. Other preparations necessary to install the new air-conditioning split system were finalized. Throughout this period the Museum's collections remained in storage in the much villified container on the front lawn. This was finally removed in June, 1997.

A new storage system was designed and installed during this period, with special racking for the painting collection. The roof of the Archaeological North Store became increasingly deteriorated during

this period and a new roof was installed at this time. Major repairs and renovations were effected in the Cafeteria during this period.

The Museum was forced to replace the air conditioning unit for the Cunard Gallery in order to continue our climate control for these collections. Interim repairs and maintenance programmes were initiated for the computer system and one unit was also replaced.

PERMANENT EXHIBITIONS

RE-INTERPRETING THE PAST: A new look for the Religion and Education Exhibits.

Upgrading permanent exhibits is an integral part of the on-going developmental process of any museum. New research comes to light, staff develop new skills, improved technology and materials as well as access to funding, are all major considerations for making the decision to re-interpret or re-design any exhibit.

Education Curator Wendy Donawa used this approach to revise and install new displays for the **Religion and Education** exhibits in the Jubilee Gallery, because of their historical inter-relationship these themes were developed together.

Religion was expanded to consider the historical and political influences that have shaped many (over 100) of the religious groups on the island. The exhibit also looked at contemporary aspects and issues within 20th century religious activity. The section on Education now includes documents, school texts and artifacts that reflect the values, attitudes and curriculum of their times.

TEMPORARY EXHIBITIONS

The exhibition programme for this period was one of the most dynamic ones yet, both in terms of the range of artistic expression and subject matter, and also in terms of a much improved sales revenue. While the impact of each show on the general public's sensitivities may be said (in the short term) to be difficult to gauge, the importance and enjoyment of art to collectors was certainly reflected in the bottom line

where gross sales for the period amounted to approximately \$72,000, with the Museum earning more than \$17,000 in commissions and fees.

'Isolation' - April to May

For those familiar with the work of Ras Ishi Butcher - winner of a gold medal in the First Biennial of Painting in Santo Domingo, his first solo show was long overdue. Organised and curated by architect Mervyn Awon, this dynamic exhibition illustrated the impressive growth and development of an artist considered to be among those currently in the vanguard of cutting-edge art.

'Son of the Light' - May to June

As Barbadian folk-artist Francis Griffith approached his 80th year, the Museum took the opportunity to mount the first ever solo exhibition of his work. Griffith's unique, intuitive style has gained considerable attention. The show, which included a number of works from private collections, was curated by guest curator and art historian Ms. Allison Thompson, with funding provided by the Organisation of American States (OAS).

'Art Ani-mal' - July to August

The mid-summer exhibition of Ras Akyem Ramsey's vibrant and exciting works reconfirmed the artist's philosophy - "that it is an art rooted in his own experiences as Akyem - a black man, a Rastafarian, and as an artist in the developing world". Therefore, although his work has received acclaim in several prestigious exhibitions outside of Barbados, and he has drawn on influences outside of the region, he is still rooted in the Afro-Caribbean experience. The exhibition was once again curated by Mr. Mervyn Awon.

'Patterns of Nature' - Aug to Sept

For this exhibition Guyanese photographer Robert Fernandes focussed on the natural forms and objects which exist within Guyana's rich natural environment and eco-systems. Fernandes' objective however, was not to merely record what the mortal eye can see, but use the

camera's lens to depict a microscopic - albeit abstract world, rich in texture, depth and colour. A major educational objective for the Museum in having this type of exhibition is to give the public exposure to the medium of photography as an art form.

Philatelic Society Commemorates 100th Anniversary – Sept to Oct

The members of the Philatelic Society celebrated this occasion with an exhibition which included historic and rare Barbadian stamps. The purpose was twofold; first to examine the subject within a Barbadian context from a historical and technical point-of-view, and secondly to promote stamp-collecting as a hobby and encourage new membership to the Society.

Jewellery and Paintings by Disa Allsopp - Dec - Jan

Leading jewellery designer Disa Allsopp held her first solo exhibition of work at the Museum. Just prior to this event, Disa had completed a Masters programme in Jewellery-making and silversmithing in the United Kingdom.

She has developed a reputation for creating one-of-a kind pieces in precious and semi-precious gems and minerals, and combining these with natural materials such as tropical woods and coral stone. Three themes were depicted in her work, which included paintings - local flora and fauna, sugar cane and various objects from the Museum's African collection.

'Rethinking Craft' - Feb. - Mar, 1996

In the wake of the 1995 Fine Craft Festival, the Museum invited some of the island's leading craftspersons to show their work in a group exhibition which was held at the new Holetown community complex.

The artists worked in a wide range of materials including metals, ceramics, wood and textiles. Many of the items were functional - mostly homefurnishings, such as furniture and light fixtures, tableware and woven planters. Others were more decorative like the exotic jewellery, silk scarves, and painted vessels of glass or calabash.

Participating craftspeople included Olwin Bristol (baskets), John Burgess (metal-work), Nefertari Caddle (Jewellery), Annalee Davis (Furniture and home ornaments) Juliana Inniss (pottery), Derek Went (textiles), David and Goldie Spieler (pottery), Onkphra Wells (wooden boxes), Janice Whittle (textiles), and Lisa Cozier and Terri Briscoe (metal work).

Contemporary Barbadian Art: Group Show – Mar – April, 1996

In 1995 the Barbados Industrial Development Corporation made a commendable effort to 'export' art abroad by sending a group show of Contemporary Art from Barbados to North Carolina, U.S.A. A follow-up show was held at the Museum. Most of the participating artists are quite well known locally and included: Arlette St. Hill, Nick Whittle, Jean Blades, Joyce Daniel, Joscelyn Gardner, Darla Trotman, Annalee Davis, and newcomers Helen Carnegie and Walter Bailey.

There was considerable diversity in the subject matter, styles, techniques and personal philosophies of each artist. The range included work which was representational, abstract, photo-realistic. Only one photographer, Bailey, was represented.

Picture This: Images by a Son of the Soil, July - August, 1996

In July, New York - based professional photographer Carl Dottin, exhibited his creative side in a solo exhibition. A Barbadian by birth, Carl is currently Assistant Vice President of Sotheby's International, New York. He has been developing a portfolio of artistic photographic work which has been exhibited in a number of galleries in the United States and Canada.

"Picture This" consisted of a series of large-format black and white photographs. It was divided into several areas each revolving around a set of still lifelifes, figure studies, nudes and landscapes. Dottin's skill and experience was evident in the ways he used various photographic techniques to convey moods. The subtle exploitation of light and shadow, selective use of sharp (or soft) focussing, extreme close-ups and tight cropping - gave the images a surreal and dream-like quality.

"Quest": Contemporary Paintings by Neville Kamau Crawford August - September, 1996

Neville, or 'Kamau' as he prefers to be called, is a local self-taught artist who started some eleven years ago to paint full-time with a vengeance. Although he has participated in many exhibitions both at home and abroad, this was Kamau's first solo show, important to him because it clearly conveyed a confidence and continuing exploration as evidenced by the exhibition's title.

Held in August, the exhibition consisted mainly of brilliant, bold, semi-abstract canvasses ranging in size from 12 inches square to 6 feet across. While the artist claims that his main stylistic influences stem from expressionism and surrealism, the subject matter was clearly influenced by his personal experiences and surrounding physical environment.

"Arrows": An Exhibition of Prints, October - November 1996

Artist/printmaker and teacher Indrani Nayar-Gall mounted an exhibition of her most recent work at the Museum's Gallery. The prints consisted of intaglios and 3 dimensional, mixed media print constructions on hand-made paper.

Mrs Nayar-Gall is an accomplished printmaker with both a Bachelors and Masters degree in printmaking from her native India. Throughout this particular series, the artist very effectively expressed her concerns with global issues such as consumerism, the international power struggle, the diffusion and loss of cultural identity, gender and race. And as the artist puts it,"..... the principle elements of my work are strongly inspired by the power of traditional African art, and the visual expression of the Indian grass-roots."

The exhibition drew high praise for the intricacy and competence of the work. Mrs Nayar-Gall also held a number of sessions on printmaking for senior high school students.

From Welchman Hall to Westmoreland: 30 Years of Change, 1966–1996, November 1996

The Museum mounted an exhibition looking at Barbados' post-Independence development, during November to commemorate the nation's 30th anniversary of Independence. Its purpose was to identify and interpret, some of the most eventful and exciting changes which have occurred in, or affected, our lives over the last 30 years.

Topics ranged from the more obvious ones such as political and constitutional events leading up to independence, to popular culture such as dress and music - influenced as they were by the hippy and Black Power movements of the late sixties and seventies. The range while diverse, was carefully thought out to include other important subjects such as telecommunications; education; the labour movement; women's rights; heritage preservation; national symbols; industry, commerce and manufacturing; the print media; sports; tourism; transportation; architecture; religion and domestic life.

Visitors were able to see personal items worn by public figures like the cumberband worn by Prime Minister Errol Barrow at the flagraising ceremony on November 30th 1966; part of Sir Deighton Ward's morning suit; part of the ensemble worn by Dame Nita Barrow at her installation as the island's first female Governor-General; as well as two of the first costume shirts worn by the popular group 'the Merrymen' at the beginning of their professional career. Included in the exhibition was a flag of the defunct West Indies Federation, the first type-setting machine and a first edition cover of the Nation newspaper, a model of a solar system tank, and Leah Martindale's swimsuit and cap which she wore in the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta.

"These Fields and Hills...": Views of our Landscape, December 1996 - January 1997

For these past few years painter Winston Kellman has combed the countryside sketching and painting derelict sugar factories and their surrounding environments. The result of this effort was a series of watercolours, charcoal drawings and some oils which went on display at the Museum in December.

Why factories? For the most part many are huge and lonely structures of crumbling mortar and rusting iron, usually ignored and generally discounted as part of our landscape. They now exist as relics of a by-gone era, when sugar could make or break a country consumed with its production. Others are active, spewing steam and smoke from their chimneys. Through the artist's eye each factory

takes on a personality of its own, forcing us to come to terms with, and appreciate its presence.

Out of Elements, February - March, 1997

The Museum selected four craft artists known for their original and interesting work, and presented it in a show in early February, 1997. The exhibition was curated by Lesley Barrow-Whatley - the History/Art Curator, and held in the Museum's Gallery at the Holetown Complex, St. James.

"Elements" featured quality crafted work made out of clay, wood, paper, and metal. The pieces included Imin Waterman's whimsical papier-mache candle holders, bowls, boxes and mirror frames; Onkphra Well's exquisite mahogany sculptured keepsake 'boxes'; Juliana Inniss' painted terracotta wall hangings, and John Burgess' candelabras of welded scrap iron and copper tubing.

The show attracted many walk-in visitors as the gallery is located in the centre of a tourist district.

"Sun Spaces": Prints by Virginia Smit, February - March, 1997

American artist Virginia Smit held an exhibition of monotypes and monoprints. A seasoned exhibitor, Smit has had twelve solo exhibitions in the United States. The prints in this show were inspired by studies Smit made during her frequent travels to the Caribbean. The pieces themselves reflect this in their brilliant colours, tropical scenes and images. Included in the show was a descriptive panel explaining what monoprints and monotypes are. A special session with students from various of the island's secondary school was held with the artist.

EDUCATION PROGRAMMES

Schools Programmes

The Education programme continues to be linked to the curriculum in both primary and secondary schools, with the majority of these specialized tours being undertaken by our highly trained, dedicated docents, who managed the programme throughout the year.

Docents

The docents were subjected to intensive training throughout 1995-97. Some of the topics for their training seminars included, the marine ecosystems, the museum as an educational resource and the Amerindians. This year training extended for the first time to the Barbados Gallery of Art, to allow the docents to become familiar with common themes which can be developed during the joint tours which are being planned.

In May 1995 one of our docents Daisy Frost, was honoured for her long and outstanding service. She is the only one of the original five docents who is still faithfully conducting tours. Her tours are especially creative and for her dedication and commitment a plaque now stands outside the Children's Gallery reading "Docent Emeritus, 1995 Daisy Frost". She was also declared an Honorary Member of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society.

The docents completed ten years of service to the Museum and celebrated this achievement in October of 1996 with a thanksgiving service, a fundraising activity, a Highland tour and a social and cultural event. During the week special tours were created for different galleries. These tours are designed to be more creative adding song, poetry, storytelling and activities to keep children involved. Much of this was organised by Mrs Frost who functioned inspite of being hospitalised with a broken leg. A special fundraising activity raised funds in support of the Museum's Library.

Junior Curators Programme

The Junior Curators Programme employs 6 - 8 young people who have interests in History, Culture, Art and preserving our heritage. Like the docents, they were well trained and exhibited their skills in the business-like manner in which they approached their tours and other duties. They attended several seminars in the afternoon as well as assisting Curatorial and Administration staff with many time consuming jobs.

Their activity continued into the summer of 1996 which was extremely hectic. In addition to doing tours the Junior Curators assisted with the "Summer Specials" programme which was a series of show and tell lecture discussions aimed at mature audiences.

The Junior Curators also assisted in the shop and in reception for staff members who were on leave, repaired costumes from the Chil-

dren's Gallery and participated in the archaeological salvage dig at Heywoods under the guidance of United Kingdom archaeologist Maureen Bennell.

The activities of the Junior Curators were made possible by a generous donation from the Multinational Women's Organisation.

ARCHAEOLOGY

Heywoods

After successfully negotiating funding for the 1995 Heywoods Salvage Operation, Ms. Philippa King supervised operations which included surveying the site and conducting rescue archaeological activities, prior to the development of a marina by Port St. Charles Development Ltd. The salvage team included U.W.I. history student Kevin Farmer, and four of Dr. Drewett's students who stayed on to help after the completion of the Silver Sands investigations.

During February 1996, British archaeologist Mary Hill Harris researched and documented the archaeological collections from the 1995 field programme at Heywoods and Silver Sands.

In April 1996, while the marina development was progressing, the Barbados Museum received information that substantial quantities of prehistoric material were being uncovered, and unfortunately, that members of the public were removing the artifacts. This caused quite a furore and re-activated calls for the enactment of legislation to protect antiquities. Although drafting of the legislation started in 1986, the final version is yet to be presented to Parliament.

The Museum, under the able direction of Mrs Maureen Bennell was able to salvage a considerable quantity of material including several large water catchment vessels. These finds included 30 sets of stacked bottomless ceramics pots overturned to provide well casings to protect the spring water for the use of the prehistoric Amerindian communities. These are somewhat rare in this region. Individual sets of stacked pots have been excavated in Carriacou, Mustique and latterly, two in Barbados. However, the Heywoods excavations are remarkable for the concentration of potstacks, postholes, as well as the remains of rare wooden samples, including apparently the base stumps

of a double posthole. Special thanks to Museum members and volunteers Dr. Ronald Hinds, Michelle Brown, Bruce Jardine and Angela MacGeogh. Generous support was provided by Port St. Charles Development Limited.

This represents an extremely rare and important archaeological find not just for Barbados, but for the entire Caribbean region. The sheer number and proximity of the features are probably unique. The site later gained international recognition (See Public Relations and Marketing). A major excavation on an untouched part of the site is scheduled to take place in summer 1997, under the direction of Dr. Peter Drewett.

Greenland

A consultant for the Greenland Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) met with Museum staff to discuss concerns related to the possibility of finding archaeological material on the proposed landfill site. The Museum negotiated permission to do a surface search for any evidence, and later for an archaeologist to survey the site prior to the completion of the EIA.

The Amerindian site at Greenland was discovered in April 1960 during construction of the brick and tile factory (The Bajan, September, 1960). During a two -week period, then Director of the Barbados Museum, Mr. Neville Connell, salvaged artifacts from depths of up to eight feet (Taylor, 1981). Over 300 shells tools were recovered together with several complete or reconstructable pots, pottery sherds, spindle whorls, stone tools, shell beads and shell debris. Human bones indicated disturbed burials.

The site at Greenland appears therefore to have been a major habitation and burial site occupied by Amerindians during the period c. 650 - 1100 A.D. It's importance lies in the fact that it is one of the very few inland sites of this period known in Barbados. Most known sites are coastal whereas this one is two miles inland. The site appears to have had excellent preservation due to soil slumping over the occupation flow. The full extent of the site has not however, been archaeologically assessed.

The area of the proposed landfill is about half a mile northeast of the archaeological site in an area not formerly surveyed archaeologically. Ms. Philippa King and Dr. Peter Drewett both undertook surface surveys of the landfill area but located no prehistoric artifacts. Finally on 25th May, 1995, Dr. Drewett visited the landfill site and examined geological test trenches being excavated by Stanley Associates. No archaeological material of either prehistoric or historic date was recovered. In addition we assisted with research on the other sites mentioned in the report.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

Codrington College - 1995 marked the 25th anniversary of the College. To this end, the Museum was asked to mount an exhibition which traced the historical development of the Codrington estates, and the establishment of the College as an educational institution. The exhibition presented an opportunity to display the institution's unique archaeological collection and those valuable documents not readily available to the public.

One of the first steps which Curator Lesley Barrow-Whatley took, after consultation with the College's Principal - Canon Titus, was to try to locate those graduates from the College who might still have personal memorabilia related to their association. This route proved fruitless, but it forced the curator to draw on what existed in the Codrington collection.

A look in the College's library unearthed quite a number of early photographs, albums, building plans and prints which depicted the changes which occurred over the years both in terms of the staff and student body, as well as the physical surroundings. Canon Titus also came forward with interesting material such as a bound Baptismal record of the slaves who were born around 1834, plans of estate lands and building such as Codrington College High School, as well as surveys of the natural resources found on the adjacent estates belonging to the Society. In addition to the archival material, there was 17th and 18th century material which Prof. Tom Loftfield had excavated from the site. Much of it was pottery which related to the material culture of the slave population on the estate.

Greenland - The Director attended the initial EIA Steering Committee meeting on 12th May at the invitation of the Ministry of Health and the Environment to introduce the EIA consultant and to make

members familiar with his draft recommendations for Solid Waste Management in Barbados. Further sessions were attended by Curator Philippa King during which the Committee reviewed the EIA process, making recommendations re the identification of a site for solid waste disposal. During this period the Museum also organised an archaeological survey of the site with the assistance of Dr. Peter Drewett.

Visual Art and the Law - On behalf of the Barbados National Committee of ICOM the Museum hosted the highly successful evening workshop "Visual Art and the Law" on May 8th, 1996. Almost 100 people attended this innovative workshop, the proceedings of which it is hoped will be published in the future.

National Consultation on Culture – The Director participated in the National Consultation on Culture on May 26th and 27th 1995 (and subsequently in October 1996) at the invitation of the Ministry of Education, Youth Affairs and Culture, both as representative of the Barbados Museum and as part of the coordinating committee. She also prepared proposals for the Ministry on Heritage Preservation in relation to the Caricom Regional Cultural Policy.

The Museum was requested by the Ministry of Health and the Environment to serve on an Environmental Education Committee with responsibility for planning a national environmental survey, and developing public programmes. The Education Officer is representing the Barbados Museum and Historical Society on this committee.

Ms. Marina Burke, owner, operator and doll-maker, runs Mama's Little Things: Doll Museum which houses her collection of dolls, doll furniture and miniature collectibles. Curator Lesley Barrow-Whatley visited at her invitation for intensive advisory session on simple ways in which she could improve the museum.

Barbados National Trust – At the request of the **Barbados National Trust**, Mrs. Whatley conducted a site visit to the Sugar Museum at Portvale and submitted a condition report on the displays – in particular the labels, murals and other illustrative display material. The report gave specific recommendations on preventative care, maintenance and replacement of these display elements. She also advised the Trust on various methods for organising the photographic collection, as well as providing training in methods of label-making.

Barbados Consulate in Toronto, Canada – Following a request from the Consulate, the Museum arranged for images from its photographic and postcard collection to be used in their display commemorating the 30th Anniversary of the island's independence.

Fish Folk Museum – Both Education Officer Peggy McGeary and Curator Lesley Barrow-Whatley attended several meetings on the Oistins Development Proposal at the behest of the Ministry of Tourism. In addition Mr Buddy Larrier of the Oistins Development Trust requested the Museum's input on their proposal for a Fish Folk Museum.

Montserrat National Trust – Through the financial support of the Ministry of Education, Youth Affairs and Culture the Director travelled to Montserrat to assist that Montserrat National Trust in their storage and documentation of the national collection, to protect these artifacts in the event of a disaster. Guidance was also given on the development of an institutional emergency plan, during the June 27-30 visit.

The Director was invited by the Ministry of Education, Youth Affairs and Culture to form part of the delegation to the meeting of the **Standing Committee of Ministers of Education (SCME)** held in Barbados 22-25th April at Sherbourne. During this period, she acted in an advisory capacity on matters related to culture and offered recommendations (which were accepted) for the position taken by the Barbados Government on the final draft of a Regional Cultural Policy, UNESCO and EEC projects for culture.

SPECIAL EVENTS

1995 and 1996 Fine Craft Festivals

The 1995 Festival was overall a resounding success in terms of participation, and this was reflected in gross sales which amounted to some \$30,000.00. While there are several other opportunities during the year for craftspeople to exhibit and sell their work, our festival has earned the reputation of being a very important event in their calendar - both as a showcase for displaying exciting and innovative craft items, and for attracting a large clientele who have come specifically to purchase craft as Christmas gifts.

The 1996 Festival was attended by over 800 persons. A variety of crafts Jewellery and gifts were available. The festival grossed some \$35,000.00 in sales despite strong competition. The work of fifty artists were on sale. Another dimension was added with numerous activities for children. Once again a critical success.

Association of Caribbean Historians Conference

The 28th Annual Conference of the Association of Caribbean Historians attracted about 125 participants, primarily from overseas. A wide variety of activities were laid on for the entertainment of the historians but much praise was lavished on the reception hosted for the delegates by the Museum on April 17th. Our dedicated volunteer guides were in attendance to give special tours during the evening. Librarian Betty Shannon displayed a special showing of rare books in the Library. Our principle sponsors were The Central Bank of Barbados, an excellent corporate citizen and the Barbados Turf Club, a great neighbour. Further support was received from the Pine Hill Dairy, Barbados Bottling Company and Banks (B'dos) Breweries.

Museum Alive Programme

The Museum courtyard came alive on December 8th, 1995 with music. The theme for the evening was 'Follow the Star'. Two large candles flickered in the north and south corner of the lawn and from these all other candles received their light. The effect was magical. From the same points on the lawn, Sharen Carmichael and Edith Barnard-Doughty (the coordinators) started the singing and lead the candle-light procession which started main activity of the evening.

Volunteers received tokens of appreciation for their efforts during the year and then sang their unique version of "The Twelve Days of Christmas" penned by the talented Daisy Frost. The Museum's President, Dr. Trevor Carmichal welcomed members and their families who had taken time to be involved. The courtyard echoed with the laughter of children and occasional applause. Late Patron of the Society, Her Excellency, Dame Nita Barrow, GCMG, DA, participated throughout, but had her special moment in the final story when she became a fairy godmother who sprinkled fairy dust so that those who were touched by it would experience the true peace and joy of Christmas all year.

The Museum Alive Programme continued on July 20th, 1996 with a show entitled 'The Brightest Jewel' - A Celebration of Sugar....held at the Barbados Museum. Once again it was led by Sharen Carmichael and Edith Doughty. Some thirty persons attended this performance featuring the Museum's docents in song.

PUBLIC PROGRAMMES

In October of 1995 a team from the **Ministry of Education** visited the Museum to look at our exhibits and the relevance to the schools curriculum. As a result of this visit, plans were set in place to host a **Teacher's Seminar**. This seminar on Object-based learning/teaching, took place in September, 1996. There was a very good response and soon afterwards St. Giles Primary requested a similar seminar for their staff on Teacher's Professional Day.

Black History month is February. It was celebrated at the Museum for the first time in 1996 with three lectures-one by Dr. Richard Allsopp entitled "Barbados, Bim, Bimshire - How did We Get These Names", "The Barbados-Carolinas Connection" by Dr. Trevor Marshall, and by Alvin Thompson "Happy Happy Slaves". The audiences were encouraging, and enthusiastic.

The Museum was also involved with the **Ministry of Health** in developing a programme on **Culture and Health** in recognition of the theme for United Nations Day 1996. The panel discussion on May 28th, chaired by Mrs Kathleen Drayton met with a modest audience (due to the rescheduling of the events and public relations problems). Nevertheless, the audience response was extremely positive recommending further activities in the future.

Black History month was again celebrated in February 1997 with two activities. February 20th, 1997 a programme entitled 'Bridging the Gap', with over 100 senior citizens from the National Assistance Board being entertained by 60 children from St. Martins Mangrove Primary. In exchange the senior citizens told stories of the Old Time Barbados, Penny Bank, Old time weddings, and gave demonstrations on how to play warri. It was a rewarding experience for all.

A panel discussion entitled "Culture and Health" was held in the Temporary Exhibition Gallery of the Barbados Museum following on from the 1996 Programme. The panelists were Dr. Irvine Brancker, Dr. Richard Cohen, Dr. Caddle, and Dr. James Wilson who provided a vigorous interplay of ideas before a lively and appreciative audience.

Museum Open Day was held on May 18, 1996 in celebration of International Museums Day. Over 700 persons visited the museum and enjoyed a varied programme - both string and steelband music,

sticklicking and folksinging. Open Day of 1997, saw a dramatic increase in numbers to over 4000 persons following extensive publicity. There was an exciting programme which included playing or learning warri and potta, pickups, ring games, and hopscotch. All this was coupled with good entertainment in the form of Barbados Landship, Dancin' Africa and the Police Band.

The Education Officer participated in a number of activities which were designed to educate the public about the Barbados Museum and its programmes. A booth was set up and information was made available to the public at a **Careers Showcase** sponsored by the Barbados Tourism Authority at Sherbourne Centre in May 1996. Careers in the field of heritage preservation were highlighted. Similar topics were discussed at a **Careers Day** at the St. Michael's School.

The **Summer Special** Programme consisted of a series of 12 lectures organised wirh a range of speakers addressing an ambitious and diverse selection of topics. In general audiences numbered between 20-35 persons at these morning sessions, although presentations on Archaeology and Antique Furniture drew the highest audiences with over 70 participants each. We were very much encouraged by the public response to the programme. Peggy McGeary and Lesley Barrow-Whatley worked assiduously to organise speakers and the accompanying media coverage.

In January of 1997, a session was held with the Government Information Service which gave general information about the education programmes of the Museum. This same information and much more, formed the basis of an extended discussion at a meeting of the Kiwanis North in March of 1997.

Tours and talks were the order of a special day in February 1997 for the **United Taxi Owner's Association** and a group of local Tour Operators. Refreshments for the former were supplied compliments of Banks Breweries and Purity Bakeries and Co. Ltd.

Other special tours included members of the Kellogg International Leaders Programme, His Excellency Mr. Zekki Cellikkol, Turkish Ambassador The United States Embassy party, and members of the European Commission.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND MARKETING

The Education Officer conducted special tours throughout the period under review. There were several visiting journalists from England, United States, Canada and Germany. These were usually booked by the **Barbados Tourism Authority**, Groups from foreign universities - Toronto, Louisville Kentucky and North Carolina - also requested special lectures/talks, on aspects of Barbadian history.

A brochure was designed and created by Kristine Dear of Soft Graphix free of cost, arranged by Robert Foster of McCann Erickson through the **Barbados Art Directors Association** (BAD) the printing was done by Coles Printery. The brochure is a six panel items which provides information on the Museum.

American Express Heritage Preservation Program

The Director prepared and submitted a nomination to the abovenamed programme identifying the **Heywoods Archaeological Recovery Project** as a worthy candidate for consideration. Out of 19 nominations from 12 countries, the Heywoods Project was selected to receive one of these prestigious Awards. These were presented during the Caribbean Tourism Organisation's Conference where Barbados' Minister of Tourism accompanied the Director to receive the medal, plaque and the citation.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Director participated in a Conference on "Heritage Tourism and Caribbean Development" organised by the University of the West Indies at Mona, Jamaica from 8th to 11th March, 1995. She was invited to present a paper on Caribbean Museums: Potentials for Heritage Tourism.

The Librarian Mr. Betty Shannon attended a copyright conference hosted by the Canadian Museums Association Canada, 30th - 31st October while on her vacation.

The Museum was the venue for a MAC/OAS workshop entitled Disaster Mitigation in Caribbean Museums which took place on March 18th, 1995. Led by two consultants, six Barbados Museum staff benefited from the programme, as well as representatives from the National Cultural Foundation, the Barbados Gallery of Art, The Barbados National Trust, the National Library Service, and sixteen other delegates from around the region.

Also during the period under review the Barbados Museum was represented for the first time at the annual **CERO** conference, following our request to the Ministry of Education. This one day workshop on June 13 was attended by Curator Lesley Whatley and oriented her as to the scope and tenor of CERO operations.

The Museum Staff enjoyed their second annual staff tour on June 24 1995 during which they visited Tyrol Cot, The Sugar Museum, and Welchman Hall Gully courtesy of the Barbados National Trust, and Harrison's Cave. Their tour also took them to Silver Sands where Dr. Drewett offered a special tour over the archaeological site.

In June 1996 this intrepid group turned their attentions to the archaeological site at Heywoods, St. Nicholas Abbey, The Flower Forest, and then to Oughterson Zoo and Park.

The gardening staff of the Barbados Museum and Historical Society have been involved in a month long horticultural training programme organised by the **University of the West Indies** every weekend in November 1995. We have already seen a significant improvement in our garden maintenance as a result.

Seven (7) members of our Shop, Reception and Security Staff participated in a three-day training programme organised by the **Barbados Tourism Authority** from November 27th 1995.

For the first time the Barbados Museum and Historical Society was part of the Barbados Contingent who attended the **Seatrade Convention** in Miami Beach, Florida. The goal of attending this convention was to make linkages with key personnel in the cruise industry business, both local and international. It was also intended to raise public awareness of the Barbados Museum as a shore destination. The convention proved productive and was beneficial to the Museum and our newly appointed Marketing Officer.

PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

Biodiversity Programme

The United Nations Development Program (UNDP) contributed US\$15,000 towards the Barbados Museum's Biodiversity Programme which the institution has been pursuing since 1992, but which got its formal start in 1995. This injection of funds, which are provided under the Global Environmental Fund's (GEF) Small Grants Programme, went a long way towards realizing our goal of providing a permanent repository for natural history specimens. The Organisation of American States (OAS) also contributed generously to the programme. The combined funds were primarily used to acquire storage and preservation equipment, a computer and software to support the activities of the Biodiversity Programme.

Curator of Natural History, Philippa King conceptualized the Biodiversity Programme and has been working on its development even while on study leave for sixteen months. During her absence she was ably assisted by Mr. Gerard King who was hired as a Research Assistant.

Many of the systems to be used in collecting, documenting and preserving the specimens are in place, and we are swiftly re-organising our storage areas, as well as our disaster preparation and recovery systems, to cope with the expected increase in specimens.

SHILSTONE MEMORIAL LIBRARY

STAFF ACTIVITIES

A research library such as ours receives many requests for assistance. These are activities which we perform to the best of our ability in the belief that they are important functions of libraries working with a collection of West Indian material.

It seems proper to pause briefly and reflect that, in an age often awed by quantity, quality has its own quiet rewards. The Museum takes this opportunity to thank the Library volunteers for their competence and the courtesy with which they have maintain the standards of the library.

To Mrs Harriet Burke who has now returned to the States, we miss her especially, while we say thank her for the donations of type-

writer ribbons and expanding folders, also to Mrs Maris Corbin for her donation of expanding folders, and Mrs Beryl Birch for donation of her paper trimmer.

USES OF THE LIBRARY

Genealogical material continues to play a vital part in our research. Over 1,500 letters requesting information, 50 enquiries by telephone, and 410 persons used the library during the period under review, on a wide variety of research topics.

Between July 22 to August 19th the Library was closed while the Librarian and her volunteers undertook a comprehensive stocktaking, last implemented in 1989. This exercise led to the identification of books for disposal, for conservation, and lost or replaced items. Space continues to remain a major concern for the Library.

STAFF CHANGES

Appointments

New faces at the Museum include Ms. Melva Yarde the Executive Officer who started work with us on June 1, 1995, replacing the Administrator, Mr. Douglas Martindale. Ms. Yarde brings with her many years experience in financial and personnel management in the private sector. Ms. Yarde is already hard at work untangling the anomalies and deficiencies in our accounting system. Her brisk approach and knowledge of local labour conditions brings an invigorating freshness to the Museum's administration system.

The Museum said a sad goodbye to Mrs Wendy Donawa the Education Curator of 10 years. Wendy played a major role in the development of the existing education and public programmes and the docent and Junior Curator programmes. She contributed in every sphere of museum life and for this alone she will be sorely missed! Honorary membership was also bestowed on Mrs Donawa.

Also joining us in her place was Mrs Peggy McGeary as of 1st September 1995, as Education Officer. With over 20 years experience in the Secondary School system, and a masterly knowledge of Barbadian folk culture, Mrs. McGeary has quickly come to enhance the Museum's cultural programming and broadened our appeal to a wider audience base. Her easy manner and enthusiastic approach have served the Museum well.

Receptionist Mrs. Sylvia Charles-Dolcy left the Museum's employ at the end of April, 1995 and was replaced by Mrs. Wendy Husbands in that post in early November.

As part of its new marketing thrust the Museum established a new post and appointed Marketing Officer, Ms. Maria Boyce who took up her post on the 6th January, 1997. Ms. Boyce possesses a degree in Political Law from the University of the West Indies. She has worked in the field of publishing and communication since her graduation and had undergone an indepth programme in communications management at Peabody, Massachusetts USA.

Ms. Boyce stated that she sees her new post as a challenge, however she is extremely enthusiastic. She believes the Museum has a wealth of resources, and is determined that all aspects of the market are educated about the institution.

Staff Leave

Natural History Curator, Mrs. Philippa King took study leave from October to pursue an MBA in Canada. Her temporary replacement, Mr. Gerard King, was hired under contract following several weeks of training as Assistant Curator, from 1st November for 8 months.

FUNDRAISING

A Museum Fundraiser was held on Saturday June 10th, 1995. This was a play organised by "Trouble in Paradise" whose co-ordinator Mr. Brian Smith donated the full proceedings to the Barbados Museum. We would like to express our appreciation to Mr. Smith, Sade Leon-Slinger, Philip Eno, Andrew McKenzie and the Technical and Stage Production crew of Trouble in Paradise. Island Inn Hotel generously provided tasty snacks for the patrons on the evening, a modest audience of eighty-five persons attended.

One of the major fundraising ventures organised by the Museum for 1996 was an elegant tea and fashion show held at the newly restored **Sunbury Plantation** on October 20th 1996. This venture was co-ordinated by the Librarian Mrs. Betty Shannon and proved an enormous success. Attended by 230 patrons it raised over \$8,000 to support the development of Library facilities. THE BARBADOS MUSEUM AND HISTORICAL SOCIETY NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS MARCH 31, 1996

1. INCORPORATION

The Barbados Museum and Historical Society was incorporated under The Barbados Museum and Historical Society Act, 1933. The Society is a non-profit institution. Its mandate is to collect, document and conserve evidence of Barbados' cultural, historical and environmental heritage and to interpret and present this evidence for all sectors of society.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) INVENTORIES

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value and are valued on the first-in, first-out basis.

b) DEPRECIATION

Depreciation has been provided for on fixed assets on a straight-line basis at rates estimated to write off the cost of these assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives. The rates used are:-

c) SUBSCRIPTION INCOME

Subscription income is accounted for on the basis of subscriptions received with no recognition being taken of subscriptions receivable.

d) CURRENCY

These financial statements are expressed in Barbados dollars.

e) INVESTMENTS

Investments in debentures are stated at cost. Dividends on debentures are recognised as income in the year of receipt.

f) ANTIQUITIES

The Society's collections of antiquities and published matter have not been reflected in the financial statements, since their market value could not be ascertained.

INCORPORATION

The Barbados Museum and Historical Society was incorporated under The Barbados Museum and Historical Society Act, 1933. The Society is a non-profit institution. Its maridate is to collect, document and conserve evidence of Barbados' cultural, historical and environmental heritage and to interpret and present this evidence for all sectors of society.

BUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) INVENTORIES
